Welcome to MGH's Palliative Care Unit

The focus of our care is on living. Our Palliative Care team provides patients and families with:

- Supportive and compassionate care
- Help to clarify and achieve goals of care
- Management of distressing symptoms, such as pain, nausea and shortness of breath
- Holistic care: meeting physical, emotional, psychosocial and spiritual needs
- Care focused on quality of life and comfort
- Support in your grief and bereavement

The life expectancy of patients on our Palliative Care Unit is usually three months or less.

A palliative care approach will neither hasten nor delay a natural death. If conditions stabilize or improve, life expectancy may be longer. In this case, we will explore with patients and families a transfer back home or a transfer to a more appropriate facility.

About our Palliative Care team

Our interprofessional team includes, but is not limited to, palliative care physicians, a palliative care nurse specialist, social worker, nurses and more. Resident physicians and other learners will also be involved in your care.

We work together to deliver care with expertise in pain and symptom management. Routine and regular visits by these healthcare providers during a patient's stay help to address individual needs like pain management and personal care (dressing, toileting, bathing).

About the Palliative Care Unit

Our unit has 22 beds. There are one-, two- and three-bed rooms. Rooms are allocated based on need.

The unit includes also a family kitchen, a lounge/dining room, a children's play space, garden terrace, laundry facilities, shower facilities and a small quiet room.

Visiting hours are flexible.

Overnight visits may be arranged.

What should I bring to the unit?

Bring items that make you feel at home, such as your favourite blanket, comfortable clothing, pictures and mementos along with the usual toiletries and non-skid shoes or socks.

Please help us to identify your daily goals in order to make each day the best it can be.

For visitors

Families may tour the unit and meet with our team members to ask questions before making decisions related to a patient's admission. Admission priority is based on need.
